Election Night: CHNA Conducts 2015 Elections at this Weeks Meeting

At the September 23 meeting, the Cochran Heights Neighborhood Association will be holding elections for four officer positions: President, Vice-President, and two Director At-Large positions. Voting is done by paper ballot, in person at the evening meeting. Candidates that were nominated in June will be listed on the ballot, and there will be blank lines to write in additional candidates that may be nominated at the meeting before the election is held. We won't have to wait long for the results, as the votes will be counted and the winners will be announced at the meeting.

As a refresher, we've put together a chart (the lower half of page 3) showing how the winners of the election will be decided once the votes have been counted.

Currently, all candidates are running for positions that they currently hold, and are running unopposed. Learn more about the candidates below.



Cochran Heights Neighborhood Association now a Texas Nonprofit Corporation

Christian Kelso (Milam St.) is proud to report that, on September 21, Cochran Heights Neighborhood Association, Inc. was registered with the Texas Secretary of States office as a Texas nonprofit corporation. This will be a completely new entity under which the neighborhood will operate. As such the Cochran Heights Neighborhood Association (which is an unincorporated association) will be wound up and thereafter cease to exist. We will now operate under the new organization which provides significant liability protections and tax benefits.

This registration in Texas is the first step towards getting our federal nonprofit status designation. Not only will this federal designation lend credibility to our organization and make us eligible for grants, but it will also make dues and donations tax deductible as charitable donations. Without this designation dues and donations have not been deductible, nor will they be until the IRS determines otherwise following a separate application. Once awarded, this federal nonprofit designation will also mean that the Association will not be subject to most income tax, as might be payable on dues for example.


Heat Wave

Do you remember how, in the last issue of this newsletter, we discussed how much rain the area was getting? In the three months leading up to that issue, we had 23.32 inches of rain.

Compared to the spring deluge, this summer saw only 4.45 inches of rain fall. More than half of that, 2.67 inches, can be attributed to a single morning storm on September 9th. Only 8 days since June 23rd have had measurable rainfall. Instead, we endured a heat wave that saw 24 days with high temperatures over 100 degrees, peaking at 107 on August 10th in the midst of a 10 –day run of highs over 100 degrees.





Trans-Siberian Orchestra: December 20th @ the American Airlines Center

Sidewalk Replacement Programs

The City of Dallas has two programs available for sidewalk replacement: Fast Fix and Cost Share.

Depending on your timeframe, you can apply to either pay the entire cost of repair or replacement of your sidewalk through an existing price agreement the city has with various contractors (Fast Fix), or you can share the cost with the city (Cost Share), though this may take additional time.

If your sidewalk has seen better days and needs to be repaired or replaced, contact the City of Dallas @ 214.948.4287 and ask for the Cost Share Program.

Resident-Only Parking

Resident-only hanging parking permits are required to park on the 5100 and 5200 blocks of Pershing, Milam and Alcott on certain days at certain times. Check signs in your area for exact restrictions. Residential permits are available for purchase at:

Parking permits cost just \$6.50 each and up to 6 permits can be purchased for each household. Bring your current drivers license, proof of auto insurance and a current utility bill with you . Parking Permits can not be ordered online or my mail.

Planning a party? Temporary parking permits are available at The Oak Cliff Municipal Center for just 10 cents each, are good the date and time you stipulate and should be displayed on your guests dash board.
